At the request of Survivors, the Police Task Force coordinated with Ontario Provincial Police and Brantford Police Underwater Search Teams to conduct the search of the Lake.

## What Survivors' Testimonies and Records Reveal About the Mush Hole

This new section will be included in every edition of the Survivors' Secretariat newsletter. In it, we will share one or two facts identified about the former Mohawk Institute that we learned about from Survivors and the research team at Know History.

### The Mohawk Institute Tunnel

In this edition, we share with you the fact of the tunnel that runs from the former Mohawk Institute to the Woodland Cultural Centre.

While there is no confirmation of what the tunnel was used for, many believe the piping within the tunnel provided heat between the two buildings. It is also believed children may have used the tunnel to go back and forth between the school and museum, as there was enough crawlspace. However, some Survivors of the former Mohawk Institute do not remember the tunnel at the time of operation.
